This is a large parish and a relatively new one, founded in 1997. Parishioners have clearly been very busy since then, attracting a congregation, building a church, and continuing to expand the facilities to meet the growing needs. In fact, driving up to the church, the progress is visible, with construction currently underway. Although I am not from the area, I understand the region around St. Stephen is developing at a rapid clip. It is impressive and indeed important that this parish is keeping pace.

Of course, the best thing about any parish is its people. Those of us visiting from the Diocese, including Bishop Knestout, were warmly welcomed by Fr. Charles Ssebalamu, Deacon Adrian Marchi, the staff, and parishioners. We were joined by members of neighboring parishes as well (equally as friendly and welcoming!), as we took the opportunity to talk about how the Appeal benefits both parishes and ministries of the Diocese.

I will be talking more about the Appeal in the coming weeks. In fact, I am pretty sure Moose wants to talk about it, too – so stay tuned!
